Librarian's Corner

*Federation of Fly Fishers
Fly Pattern Encyclopedia*
edited by Al & Gretchen Beatty

This book is not a “how to” resource in that it does not teach or show a single fly tying technique. It doesn't talk about material selection or fly tying tools. It presupposes you know the techniques or can learn them somewhere. What this book does have is the recipe for tying over 1,600 patterns. It is an extensive and comprehensive resource. Each and every pattern has a vivid color plate showing the completed fly. The book includes dry flies, nymphs and wet flies, streamers, steelhead and salmon flies, warmwater flies, and saltwater flies. It is fascinating to just wander through well over 200 pages of diverse patterns. If you want to know how to dress a particular fly this book will help you. You could easily while away an hour or two just paging through the book and enjoying the tremendous variety of patterns.

There are some tried and true favorites that have withstood the test of time and are still in use. There

are some oldies that have gone out of popular use. There are some newer flies and there are interesting ones that I would venture to say the vast majority of fly tyers have never seen or heard of.

Let's have a little smile with the names of some things. Let's say you are Gordon Swanson; you are a seasoned angler to be sure. You probably don't listen to modern rock music, Gordon, you would probably laugh at the names of many modern bands; you might even be disgusted with them.

Now let's say you're 17 years old and you don't fly fish. You would probably laugh at the names of some fly patterns; you might even be disgusted with some of them.

Often I think there are more bridges between generations than we normally think there are; they just aren't always obvious. Here are 34 "handles". Are they all names of flies from the book? Are they all names of rock bands? Are some of them flies and some of them rock bands? Before you get frustrated with kids and the crazy music of today, be careful please, there might be at least one fly pattern in this list that will make the 17 year old laugh just as much as the band names make an old timer laugh. Gordon, and all of you seasoned anglers, can you find the flies? You may have to check out the book.

In early August, my son and I were out sightseeing and stopped at Fortson. We walked up to the Fortson Hole. The river was very low, and the pool was filled with hundreds, if not over a thousand hatchery steelhead smolts that had never gone out to saltwater. They were up to about a foot long, and rising to anything that flew close to the water.

In late August, my son went fishing for sea run cutthroats above the mouth of Boulder River (Creek??). He caught no cutts, but did catch 12 hatchery smolts up to about a foot long. He said most of them were pretty skinny.

One can only wonder, will this have a severe adverse effect on future adult populations, or will these fish try to go out and survive after the fall rains put more water in the river?

EFFC Trophy Fishing Awards
Rules & Affidavit

Rules:

1. We encourage you to release the majority of fish caught to insure a future fishery. In case of two equal fish caught in the same category, the released fish will take priority. Please do not enter spawning fish.
2. Time frame for affidavits is Nov. 1 of one year and continues to Oct. 31st of the following year. Present this affidavit to the Awards Committee Chairman no later than Oct. 31st.
3. Fish must be caught on a cast fly, using conventional fly lines (no lead core) and leader with only one fly. Barbless hooks are preferable.
4. Awards will be presented for the largest fish in each category.

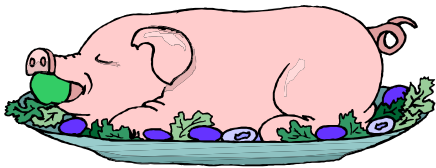
